Commentary for the Readings in the Extraordinary Form: Seventh Sunday after Pentecost

"Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. . .Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord',...but he



who does the will of my Father. . .shall enter the kingdom of heaven" (Gospel).

The Introit is a call to the tongue to pray in a "voice of joy;" a call also to action: "Clap your hand." In early ages this signified not only to praise a person by the tongue, but to work for him with the hands. If all the tree's life goes into "wagging" leaves, how can there be any fruit?

Not so much what one "says" about the Lord, but how he "does" His "Will," is what brings forth "good fruit" (Gospel). Deeds, not mere words, are acceptable to God; acceptable to neighbor also. Example is the best precept.

The final fruit of sin is "death;" the fruit of "justice" is "life everlasting" (Epistle). The Holy Eucharist is the "health-giving" (Postcommunion) Fruit of Calvary, our antidote against the poisonladen Dead-Sea fruit of the world, the flesh and the devil. Focusing the Gospel

Key words and phrases: The kingdom of heaven is like, Do you want us to, when full-grown, leavened, what has lain hidden, children of the kingdom, end of the age

To the point: "The kingdom of heaven is like" Jesus uses three comparisons to explain this mystery of God's Presence and reign. The first parable speaks of discernment; the second of full growth; the third of transformation. In this is the realization of the kingdom of heaven: our discerning God's will, our growing into full stature as "children of the kingdom," opening ourselves to being transformed into those remaining faithful until "the end of the age." The way we live reveals God's "mastery over all things" (First Reading) and that we have become "what has lain hidden from the foundation of the world." *Working with the Word* https://liturgy.slu.edu



Liturgy Matters #33

The priest has led this whole prayer, speaking in the name of the Church, acting in the person of Christ. To all that Christ has done, to all that is happening, the assembly cries out a resounding Amen. This is the biggest Amen of the Mass and so is the biggest Amen in the world. This Amen never ends; it is eternal as it echoes around the globe, echoes throughout the centuries, and echoes in the halls of heaven.

After the Great Amen that closes the Eucharistic prayer, the whole assembly is on its feet because it has been carried by this prayer into the very presence of God and into its future in Christ. Hidden in the image is the assembly standing with Christ in heaven before the throne of God. Now begins another unit of the Mass referred to as the communion rite. It begins with the Lord's Prayer.

The Lord's Prayer is an invocation of God by a name that is possible for us to call Him only through our communion in the sacrifice of Christ: the name "Father." It is important for us to remember that Jesus gave us this prayer as a way of healing with the Father. In a very real sense, the Lord's Prayer is a formula for healing. Praise + Forgiveness = Healing.

Following the Lord's Prayer is the Sign of Peace. This is a ritual exchange, not a practical greeting. By means of the set phrase, "Peace be with you," and a gesture which signifies our love for one another in Christ, we are playing out yet another dimension of communion; namely, our being joined together as one body in Christ. We who have just said together to God, "Our Father," in consequence now turn to one another and say, "Brother" and "Sister." We who have just prayed, "Forgive us as we forgive," turn to one another with this sign of reconciliation among ourselves.

The third part of the communion rite consists of the "Breaking of the Bread." This is the most ancient term by which Christians called the Mass. Here we sing, "Lamb of God," and are addressing Jesus himself by this title. He is our Passover Lamb whose body has been sacrificed, whose blood has been poured out for the forgiveness of our sins. This hymn is the same song sung eternally in the feast of heaven which the apostle reported in the book of Revelation: "As my vision continued, I heard the voices of many angels who surrounded the throne and the living creatures and the elders.
