

Only because of this divine indwelling do we have the power to forgive and thus continue Jesus' saving mission. We are the incarnation of the risen Lord in our world today. We are re-created by the Holy Spirit. The sign of

Where is the Sacrament of Confirmation in Scripture?

"I've never read anything about the sacrament of Confirmation in Scripture, so why do Catholics do it? Find out here.

The sacrament of confirmation has a lot of Biblical basis, especially in the book of Acts.

On Pentecost Sunday in Acts 2, Jesus's apostles and disciples were filled with the Holy Spirit. Jesus' followers then shared the Holy Spirit by laying their hands on others. Later in Acts 8, when the Apostle Philip would hear of people's conversions and baptisms in Samaria, Peter and John would lay their hands on these new converts to receive the Holy Spirit. Acts 8:14-17 explains how these newly baptized Christians had not yet received the Holy Spirit, which is why Peter and John would then lay hands on those who had been baptized. Thus, the act of receiving the Holy Spirit through laying of hands (i.e., confirmation) is a separate sacrament from baptism.

While baptism and confirmation are two distinct sacraments, they can be celebrated together, just as when St. Paul baptizes a group and then lays his hands on them in Acts 19:5-6. We also see these two sacraments performed in sequence when we attend an Easter Vigil Mass, as RCIA participants receive their Baptism and then their Confirmation.

Catholic practices and customs are based on Scripture and the rich traditions of our Church. The sacrament of confirmation pours the Holy Spirit into practicing Catholics and gives them the graces to live out their faith as they enter adulthood.

What is an "imprimatur"?



Ever seen this mysterious word above the copyright year in a book?

Let's start with a translation of this odd word: it's Latin and means "let it be printed."

"Imprimatur" means that a book containing spiritual or theological content has received clearance for publication.

The process of obtaining this clearance begins with the author submitting the manuscript to a bishop. This can be the bishop of the author's diocese, the bishop of the diocese of the publisher, or the bishop of the diocese where the book will be released. The bishop reads it and, judging the content by its agreement or disagreement with Catholic doctrine, he grants or denies an imprimatur.

A denial means the book is heretical. An imprimatur means that it does not contradict Church teaching. It lays no obligation on the faithful to believe or agree with the opinions expressed in the book. It doesn't even mean that the bishop himself approves of the book on a personal level! It simply means he found no concrete reason why the book ought not to be printed.

Since an imprimatur is no longer required in most cases, its presence in a book seems to put the work in a more serious light. Its meaning, however, remains the same as when it was required for every spiritual work. https://www.catholiccompany.com/getfed



Talk to any couple who are devoted to one another. Ask them when they realized they were in love — call-me-in-a-crisis love, face-the-day-to-day-with-me love — and the answer will probably not be "When I realized he was only dating me to win a bet with his boss."

If you know what movie that references, you and 12-year-old me would have been great friends.

Like any other self-respecting American tween of the early 2000s, I used to watch a lot of romantic comedies. I forget how old I was when I realized that romantic comedies are actually ... really boring. Not because they're about love — true love is fascinating. I could watch real-life people talk about who they love for hours.

Because when we say we love someone — truly love them — what we mean is we love their spirit. We love what they are. We love the qualities that escape description, the attributes we have to talk around or reduce to cliche in order to define. We cannot love a body alone. We cannot love a name or a reputation. We cannot love a story that we've built around a relationship.

To be in love with someone you need to know their spirit. Intimately. And that knowledge cannot help but change everything about you. It changes your goals, your understanding of the world. It changes the amount of courage you have to face the life ahead of you. It changes your ability to be who God wants you to be.

The disciples lived and ate and walked with Jesus for three whole years before they really knew his spirit. They didn't know it on Good Friday when they scattered and hid and wept. They didn't know it on Easter Sunday, when they couldn't believe what they saw. They thought they loved him, but when push came to shove their love failed.


But by the end of their lives, the disciples knew the kind of love that sustained them even in the face of martyrdom.
